Parents don't know the "why"

Only half of schoolage parents (52%) are aware of the well-researched² concept that kids lose valuable academic skills over the course of summer break.

Connect the dots for families

Parents of frequent readers are more likely to be aware of the loss of academic skills connected to summer reading habits than parents of infrequent readers (59% vs. 46%).
